Foothills Veterans Winter Stand Down

- **The first stand down was held in 1988 in San Diego, California. It was the brainchild of two Vietnam veterans.** It provided battle weary soldiers during the Vietnam War a retreat in a safe environment.
- Today, it is grassroots, community-based intervention designed to help the homeless veterans “combat” life on the street. **It offers homeless veterans a “hand up” not a hand out.**
- So, keeping with that spirit, **the Foothills Veterans Winter Stand Down will be held on Wednesday, November 10, 2021 from 9 am – 1 pm at the JE Broyhill Civic Center**, unless the CDC and/or the Governor has a change to COVID-19 protocols.
- **The Foothills Veterans Winter Stand Down is a collaborative effort** by the Foothills Area Stand Down Committee, Caldwell Community College & Technical Institute, and NCWorks Career Centers to bring about awareness along with community resources to address the needs of our veteran’s population with respect homelessness, clothing needs, educational/medical resources, etc.
- **What Happens at a Stand Down?** Homeless veterans come together in one location for camaraderie, food, clothing, medical, dental, and other services.
- **A stand-down also serves as a means of helping communities address their plan to end homelessness**, as well as, promoting awareness and encouraging dialogue on issues relating to homeless and at-risk veterans.
- **Veterans are provided access to community resources needed to rebuild their lives.** Veterans have the opportunity to connect with other veterans, veterans’ organizations, volunteers and service providers. Hosting a community Stand Down encourages partnership and collaboration among agencies.
- To host a successful Stand Down, a group of dedicated volunteers are needed, along with donors and sponsors, community support, financial support, and strong leaders with great organizational skills.

- Caldwell County had its first stand-down in 2015. **In 2018 & 2019, we served over 200 veterans from Caldwell and surrounding counties.**
- Here's some statistics:
 - Nationwide, there are about 19 million veterans. Of those, 698,183 veterans live in North Carolina, representing 6.7% of the state's total population. <https://www.nc.gov/agency/military-and-veterans-affairs-department>
 - More than one-third served in Vietnam, 25% served in one or both Gulf War eras, about 6% served in the Korean War, and less than 2% for WW2. <https://www.ncdemography.org/2020/11/12/nc-in-focus-2020-veterans-snapshot/>
 - According to the U.S. Department of Defense, 20 veterans die each day at their own hand. And from 2005-2017, the veteran suicide rate increased by 30%.

 - Roughly 12% of the homeless adult population are veterans. Many of those homeless veterans suffer from disabilities, substance use, unemployment, and mental illness coupled with the additional burdens of military-related factors, like PTSD, etc.

PRESENT: Mayor Joe Gibbons presiding. Councilmembers present were Mayor Pro-Tem Crissy Thomas, Jonathan Beal, Todd Perdue, Ike Perkins, Ralph Prestwood, David Stevens and Ben Willis. City Attorney T. J. Rohr and City Manager Scott Hildebran were also present.

A. The meeting was opened by a moment of silence followed by the Pledge of Allegiance as led by Mayor Gibbons.

B. On behalf of City Council, Mayor Gibbons expressed sympathy to the family of Councilmember Todd Perdue for the passing of his cousin Randall Morrison who lives in Sunset Beach. He asked everyone to keep this family in their thoughts and prayers.

**FY2020-2021 ANNUAL
AUDIT REPORT:**

C. S. Eric Bowman, PA, presented the City's FY2020-2021 Annual Audit Report. Mr. Bowman reported the City increased its unassigned General Fund Balance to 71% and has 8 ½ months of expenditures in reserve which is excellent. Mr. Bowman commended Finance Director Donna Bean and City Staff for their hard work in reducing expenditures and remarked the City has had two excellent years of financial reporting regarding both the General Fund and Fund Balance.

In addition, Mr. Bowman reported the City's Enterprise Fund for Water and Sewer's net position increased by \$1,883,457 which was outstanding.

Mr. Bowman shared the City's long-term debt increased by 7.21% for a total amount of \$1,565,482, but pointed out part of this debt is at 0% interest. Next, Mr. Bowman referred to the statement of position and shared the City has \$124,519,000 in total assets which would equal to a sizeable business in the private sector.

Mr. Bowman reiterated he enjoys working with the City as Staff is great to work with. Councilmember Stevens along with City Council agreed they were very proud of all the City has accomplished and that Mr. Bowman did an excellent job in compiling the audit report.

On behalf of City Council, Mayor Gibbons thanked Mr. Bowman for the great report and expressed Council's appreciation of City Staff and all they do for the City of Lenoir and its citizens.

- D. On behalf of City Council, Mayor Gibbons asked everyone to continue to pray for the doctors, nurses, healthcare workers and the community along with all the people that are currently hospitalized as well as those that have lost family members due to the COVID-19 virus. Mayor Gibbons encouraged everyone to continue to be safe and to wear a mask during this time.

B. ITEMS FOR COUNCIL ACTION

**CONSTRUCTION BID AWARD;
HOTEL STREET EXTENSION PROJECT:**

1. Bids were received for the Hotel Street Extension Project on Tuesday, September 21, 2021. A total of three (3) bids were received. Following review of the bids, Staff recommends awarding the Hotel Street Extension Construction Contract to the low bidder Mountain Crest, LLC. The contract value will be \$215,800.00 (base bid only.)

A copy of the bid tab is hereby incorporated into these minutes by reference. (Refer to page 338.)

City Manager Hildebran stated the City solicited five (5) bids on Tuesday, September 21 but only received three (3) replies. He explained the purpose of this project is to construct a street connection from the current terminus of Hotel Street east of Hampton Inn on Wilkesboro Boulevard to Hibriten Drive. Mr. Hildebran shared this project has been under consideration by the City since 2015/2016.

Public Works Director Jared Wright stated he has expressed concern with the contractor regarding the availability of materials in order to establish a notice to proceed. Director Wright also stated the City should have the contract for this project within the next ten (10) days and noted the project has a ninety (90) day timeline.

Councilmember Beal commented residents of this area are very excited about the project and he hopes that area businesses will benefit from the road extension as well. Mr. Beal thanked City Council and Staff for moving this project forward.

Upon a motion by Councilmember Beal, Council voted 7 to 0 to award the low bid of \$215,800.00 (base bid only) to Mountain Crest, LLC. for the Hotel Street Extension Construction Contract as presented.

- A. Councilmember Perkins inquired about the Hospital Avenue Sidewalk Project with City Manager Hildebran stating the City has executed two-thirds of the easements.

Public Works Director Jared Wright explained that details of the plans were modified with four (4) property owners for utility relocations. He further explained he has been onsite finalizing proposals for the remaining property owners and pointed out the City is waiting on funding from the State Department of Transportation which has delayed the project.

Linkside Connector/Hotel Street Capital Project – AMENDED 10/5/2021

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council Members of the City of Lenoir, North Carolina that, pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the following capital project ordinance is hereby amended:

Section 1: The project to amend activities for Linkside Connector/Hotel Street Capital Project to include the expenditure of local funds for the engineering, right-of-way acquisition, construction, and project administration for the Linkside Connector/Hotel Street Capital Project. The project is to be funded by local funds.

Section 2: The officers of this unit are hereby directed to proceed with the capital project within the terms of the budget contained herein.

Section 3: The following amended amounts are appropriated for the project:

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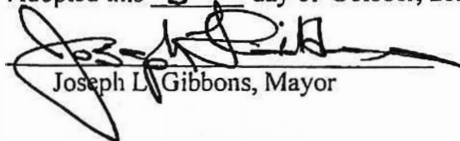

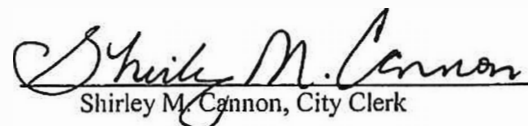
Section 6: The Finance Officer is directed to report, on a quarterly basis, on the financial status of each project element in Section 3.
